Career Development Program is State Model

This year, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts recognized Bay Cove's Career Development Program (CDP) as a Best Practices model to help teens enter the world of work. Best Practices designation identifies the CDP as a statewide prototype for school-to-work transition programs. CDP trains urban youth to be productive workers. The program

emphasizes comprehensive career exploration, job placement and on-the-job coaching, training in employment and life skills, and development of reasoning and problem-solving skills.

CDP Director Lynn Gonsalves is a member of the Massachusetts School-to-Work Technical Assistance Resource Bank. The Donohue Institute at the University of Massachusetts maintains the Resource Bank as part of the commonwealth's School-to-Work Initiative. The Resource Bank provides technical assistance and training to a variety of programs throughout the state in an effort to create a comprehensive and effective system to prepare students for productive adult employment. In these capacities she works to develop statewide standards for inclusion of at-risk and out-of-school youth in school-to-work transition and training programs. - Advocate for and increase the visibility of the population
- Track and utilize new opportunities at the local, state and federal levels to build and enhance service delivery

Technology Corner

This year, Bay Cove Academy installed an ISDN line, which gives all computers on our Local Area Network (LAN) access to the Internet and to the First Class email system at our head office at 66 Canal Street. This enables us to communicate with each other and the outside world in a more efficient manner. Most importantly, it gives the students increased exposure to the growing world of the Internet and technology. Every student in a computer science class learns how to set up and use his or her own web-based email account. Students often come to class and login to their email to get instructions for the day's assignment. They also learn to use the various search engines to research topics for classes

and to get information related to their health and well being. We are

currently upgrading our Internet connection to a Digital Subscriber Line (DSL), which will increase

our connection speeds by up to 500%. In order to take full advantage of this upgrade, we hope to be able to purchase more computers to replace those that are outdated and unable to connect to the Internet.

Computer graphic design is another area in which we wish to continue to grow. Many students have great talent in art and use these skills to create multi-media and graphic arts projects.

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Shirley Jones has been a fixture at Bay Cove Academy for over ten years. As a full-time cook for the program, Shirley provides nutritious fresh-cooked daily meals for students and staff. Shirley is also responsible for food at special events and banquets such as graduation, parents night and holiday feasts.

Technology

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As a final project, students in the introductory classes create a multimedia slide show presentation using the presentation graphics program *Astound*. These projects enable students to use skills they have learned in the first part of the course. Last year, several students participated in a rudimentary web design class in which they learned to design a web page that integrated art, music, photos and movies. We plan to increase the school's strength in the area of graphic design by purchasing additional software licenses for *Adobe Illustrator*, the industry standard illustration program.

It is impossible to expose students to every piece of hardware or software that exists. However, it is our goal that students gain enough familiarity with the functions of the most widely used types of hardware and software to provide them with skills they are likely to use in college and the workplace.
