

Our goal was to design a program that would address the educational and emotional lives of our students. A school that would give kids a chance to work out their childhood difficulties and emerge into the world of adulthood armed with hope, a renewed spirit, and a solid education.

Back then, I never had a thought that I would be here for twenty years. What is it that has kept me here for two decades? It's been the students. For me as a principal and a teacher, year after year I have had the sacred honor and privilege of participating in a child's most difficult and treacherous journey—the passage from girl to woman, from boy to man.

Career Development Department honored with Workforce Investment Act award

ay Cove's Career Devel opment Department (CDP) was recently awarded a contract under the federal Workforce Investment Act. CDP provides comprehensive career-acquisition skills to Bay Cove teens in order to prepare them for productive adult life. Employment Resources Inc (ERI), a non-profit provider of jobs for youth in the Metro North Boston area, will administer the contract.

The Workforce Investment Act is designed to provide resources to help teens learn the work skills they need to get and keep a job. CDP has been training Bay Cove students for years in age-appropriate life skills, academic and

reasoning abilities, and exploration of possible post-school career directions. In 1999, CDP was recognized as a state Best Practices model program.

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Graduation

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I never tire of watching students dig down deep and summon up the courage and strength to make use of all the opportunities and resources we offer them. It's truly inspirational.

Each student enters Bay Cove with his or her own demons to struggle with—as well as strengths to lean on. They come in every day prepared to do battle with us, with themselves, with each other. They argue with us, they cry with us, they laugh with us, they get mad at us, they allow themselves to be vulnerable with us and, yes, sometimes they even thank us.

The 2000 graduating class is an in-

credible group of seven students. Each has worked through fears, frustrations and difficulties to get to this day. Each of these young adults is leaving Bay Cove with a sense of hope for his or her future. Every one of these graduates has struggled with painful emotional issues and emerged as a stronger and wiser adult. Each has

made solid academic achievements. All have taken their first steps into the world of work and each now has plans for following his or her career path.

As I look at this year's graduates I

know we have achieved what we set out to accomplish twenty years ago. I am very proud of the work we do here, and, as you can tell, I am very proud of the graduates.

DUAL ENROLLMENT

Dual Enrollment is a state program that allows high school students to enroll in college courses concurrently with their regular classes. Students in 11th and 12th grades who are in good academic standing may enroll for classes at state colleges and universities.

Students at Bay Cove take advantage of this program on a regular basis, and seem to enjoy the challenge along with the chance to see what college life is like. This semester, three students are enrolled at Roxbury Community College, and another takes a class at Mass College of Art. Subjects include Computers, Spanish and Drawing. Though extra classes mean extra work, these students know the Dual Enrollment program could help them learn and do more in their lives.

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chase a second-hand multimedia projector. This allows us to display computer-based images on a big screen. The projector has also been useful for enhancing class presentations. Recently, Science Teacher Jennifer Kravitz used Tom Snyder's Science Court software to teach her students about fossils. Science Court is a self-contained five-day lesson that combines animated skits and classroom worksheets to make scientific principles interesting
